1. National Coordination & Marine Planning

MPA National Steering Group (NSG): The NSG met in the first week of March to set the work plan for the coming year. The key objectives are:

- 1. Establish reporting frameworks;
 - a. Use of Designated Sites System for management info.
- 2. Monitor implementation of actions in resolving risks and issues.
 - a. Review whether management arrangements for sites are effective
 - b. Deliver actions as required.
- 3. Provision of guidance and best practice
 - a. Risk based approach to activities
 - b. Include assessment of bait collection and recreation.
- 4. External funding opportunities
 - a. Highlight funding available
- 5. Communication, co-ordination and promotion of effective MPA management
- 6. Monitoring and collecting data on activities
- 7. MPA management generic advice.

Marine Planning: The MMO has now drafted policies for the South West Marine Plan under the headings of Aggregates; Cables; Climate Change; Defence; Dredging and Disposal; Economic; Energy; Environment; Fishing and Aquaculture; Governance; Ports and Shipping; Social and Cultural and Tourism and Recreation. Invoices will be sent out early in the new year for 2017/18.

b. Delivery of Priorities

Delivery against the agreed priorities for this year are as follows:

- 1. Stabilise funding: Whilst funding is stable at the moment, it has not been possible to secure long term funding to increase security. The EMS CIL funding will help, but there is no time for complacency in securing funding for the partnership.
- 2. Mid-term review of the management plan in light of Reg 35 Conservation Advice update and emerging issues relating to BREXIT: there are still uncertainties relating to the impacts of Brexit, so it is proposed to roll this on into 2017/18.
- 3. Continue to host TECF, PPMLC and TOFF meetings: Delivered.
- 4. Recreation Study for the Habitats Regulations Assessment and drafting of findings to inform strategic planning documents. : Delivered.
- 5. Secure funding and deliver CIL EMS Project.: Delivered
- 6. Contribute to the National EMS Group to support coordinated approach to management and to support coordination of South West marine plans.: NIO officer to act as EMS Rep on National Steering Group. Ongoing.
- 7. Continue to provide marine planning advice to local planning authorities. Ongoing. Next year a Supplementary Planning Guidance document will be needed for the authorities of the Joint Local Plan.
- 8. Produce a generic Non-native marine invasive species plan for the Tamar: This is being delivered through a contract by Natural England. The plan will be completed early 2017.
- 9. Support the production of the Cornwall Environment Strategy no progress has been made on the Cornwall Environment Strategy by Cornwall Council.
- 10. Renew 4 TECF Information boards. this has been deferred due to staff sickness.

3. EMS CIL Project

The funding has now been secured on the project brief which was presented at the last meeting. We are currently recruiting for a dedicated NIO EMS CIL Officer and interviews will take place on 14th March with a view to having the person in post asap. 38 high quality applications were received and it was a challenge to shortlist for interviews with such a high number of quality candidates. The new officer will be introduced to everyone as soon as he/she commences. Natural England officer will be on the interview panel.

4. Water Users Leaflet

The water users leaflet is due for a refresh and stocks are now down to zero. Reprinting should be straight forward following the work we had done on the artwork last year.

Please can everyone review the leaflet and let me know of any comments or changes that should be incorporated **by the 20 March 2017.**

5. Annual Survey

Thank you to all who replied with a response to the TECF Survey. In the end responses were received from:

- D&SIFCA
- MMO
- Duchy of Cornwall
- QHM
- Sutton Harbour
- Cattewater Harbour Commissioners
- Devon County Council

The responses received show that the level of activity in the Plymouth Sound and Tamar Estuaries has remained very stable, with no reported increases in any activity likely to cause disturbance for which the organisations were responsible during the period 2015-17.

The level of control has increased with new management measures being introduced by Devon and Severn IFCA with their new bylaws whilst the MMO are commencing with the marine plan production.

Whilst no formal response has been received from the local authorities, it is not expected to show any increase in activities other than development which is likely to result in increased recreational pressures and this is being addressed through the planning process.

Information is still awaited from Plymouth City Council, who manage the majority of the moorings in the waters, to understand whether there has been a change in their number.

Water quality is reported separately below.

6. Water Quality

- The EA have confirmed that Plym Hoe (W and E) bathing water quality as being excellent.
- Algal blooms were reported by the EA in June/July.
- EA sampling over the last 6 months has revealed a number of elevated counts of Escherichia coli and Intestinal Enterococci.
- Pollution risk notifications were issued and warning signs displayed at for Plymouth Hoe East and West on June 27th, August 6th, 25th and 26th.
- The ENS system in place at present consists of a cascade call from the EA to Public Protection Service. No calls have been received since June/July.

7. HRA Recreational Impacts Research & Appropriate Assessment

This is a key area of work in order to inform the Habitat Regulations Assessment for the Joint Plans and will be the driver for establishing how best to manage the recreational impacts in the coming years.

There is a significant amount of work to be completed over the coming months until the end of January when everything will need to be submitted, so work time available for TECF will be limited until then.

The key work areas will be in using the data to establish the mitigation strategy and partners are likely to be involved in the delivery of these looking ahead.

8. Developments

Current planning and marine planning matters include the following. This has not been updated due to staff absences.

MLP/2012/00326. Yonderberry Jetty, Torpoint. EIA Screening and scoping for replacement of facility. This is a major piece of work which requires a full environmental impact assessment and MMO have agreed to lead on this. EIA Screening is complete. Works ongoing to address environmental issues.

Natural England Update

Priority issues in the SAC

Our condition assessment carried out last year highlighted some priority issues to tackle within the Special Area of Conservation which may need management action. These are issues that are causing parts of the site to be classed as in 'unfavourable' condition. With partners we have begun working on some of these issues including:

- Discussions with key stakeholders around migratory fish passage and Gunnislake Weir.
- Engagement and training for volunteers to manage and monitor the spread of Pacific oysters in the Yealm estuary.
- Biosecurity planning attendance and funding of a stakeholder workshop (held 1st March) which will lead to production of a draft biosecurity plan.
- Continued eradication of Giant Hogweed in Tamar Valley to avoid it spreading along corridors into other publically accessible areas where it can cause injury.
- Working with local planning authorities to develop strategic monitoring and mitigation plans in relation to likely additional pressure on the Special Area of Conservation from recreation as a result of new housing in the local plans.
- Endorsing the new Baseline Maintenance Dredging Document.

Natural England's Conservation Advice on Marine Protected Areas

For anyone planning a development within or nearby the European Marine Site it is important to look at the newly produced conservation advice from Natural England.

The <u>Tamar Estuaries Complex Special Protection Area (SPA)</u> advice package has been published on our Designated Sites System.

<u>Plymouth Sound and Estuaries Special Area of Conservation (SAC)</u> and <u>Tamar</u> <u>Estuaries Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ)</u> are still in draft but can be used. Finalised packages will be available in the next few months.

Plymouth EMS and Tamar Estuary Sites MCZ Monitoring

Intertidal rocky shore monitoring 2016 – This is currently being reported on and will be shared when available..

Lynher mussel bed survey 2015 – We have received a final report from Cornwall IFCA who are continuing to monitor the bed on an annual basis. Please email me for a copy.

Shad and smelt survey 2016 – The MBA and Environment Agency have produced a report on this work (EC18234). Please email me for a copy.

We expect to be surveying the following features in 2017 but are awaiting confirmation of funding :

All intertidal biotopes, Circa-littoral reefs, shad and smelt.

The Green Blue Wildlife Guide for Boaters

The Green Blue have just launched their new national Wildlife Guide for boaters which Natural England, MMO, SNH and Wildlife Trusts have been advising on and support – the aim of which is to promote good practice to help minimise any impacts of boating activities on marine wildlife and protected sites.

To complement the guide, The Green Blue is also launching <u>Writing a Green Wildlife</u> <u>Guide for Boaters</u> to help non-boating specific organisations when developing local codes of practice for water users.

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
